Hateful & Discriminatory Language

When our students were surveyed this year, they reported that the number one issue they would like to see addressed was discriminatory and hateful language. Unfortunately, we sometimes get reports of students using degrading words, racial or homophobic slurs, or other hateful language, either in person or online.

Here are some reminders that you might like to share with your teen: if what they are saying, doing, typing, sharing, or posting could be seen as racist, misogynistic, homophobic, or cruel to people with a disability or other difference – don't do it.

These words can deeply hurt people and have ripple effects on the whole school community.

Let's all work together to encourage our teens to steer clear of these words, to be respectful of others and expect the same in return.



Encourage differences and appreciate them.



TERMINOLOGY:

Hateful Language: Hate speech is any kind of communication that uses discriminatory language with reference to a person or a group based on their religion, ethnicity, nationality, race, disability, sexuality, gender, identity or other difference.

TALK OPENLY AND FREQUENTLY WITH YOUR CHILDREN

Talk to your children - the more comfortable they will be to come to you if they experience it.

Sometimes children (and adults) use hateful language thinking it is funny or may not understand the meaning behind it. It's not funny, and it's never okay. If this happens with your child, use it as an opportunity to explore it together using reliable sources.
